The following are specific requirements for the BACHELOR OF ARTS degree that might not be met by completion of the USP Refer to your degree audit for a complete list of eligible courses for each category.

Math: Math 186, 187, 188 and 189 are non-algebra options that do not require Math 103 as a pre-requisite. Math 104 is College Algebra which requires Math 103. Most BA students can opt to bypass Math 103 (per placement).

## Global Language:

Students without previous global language preparation must complete credits in a single language by passing the final course in one of the following sequences:
-French, German, or Spanish 110, 111, 203 and 204
-Japanese 110, 111, 210 and 211
-American Sign Language - Special Education 202, 303 and 404
NOTE: For students with a global language background, a portion of this requirement may be satisfied by demonstrating competency through placement on the UW System placement test.

Placement level course:
Course sequence required to reach 204/211 level:
(Example: French 111, 203 and 204)
Humanities (HU): All Culture (XC) courses in the USP are considered Humanities.
Take one course in each of the following areas:
