3. 301: Reading Theory should be taken in the FALL or junior or senior year.
4. 400: Senior Seminar should be taken in the SPRING of senior year.

COURSE WITH PRE-REQUISITE:

1. 301: Reading Theory. Please note, these pre-reqs are in the process of being changed. Students should have at least two of the 200 level courses before taking 301. If you have met these requirements and still find yourself blocked from enrolling in the course, please speak to the course instructor.
2. 374: Human Osteology. Pre-requisite of 202.
3. 377: Forensic Anthropology. Pre-requisite of 374.
4. 400: Senior Seminar. Pre-requisite of all four 200 level course, 301, +1 methods course.

- Bioarcheological field work studying ancient health and its relationship to the environment
- Archaeological field work studying human interactions with animals
