#### **Course Information:**

Fundamental photographic theory, basic camera handling, developing, printing, and enlarging, and an introduction to photographic aesthetics. Prerequisites: 111, 112, and 114, or consent of the instructor. A \$25 lab fee is charged for this course. A special technology course fee of \$10 will also apply.

This is a beginning-level photography course. You will work exclusively with 35mm black and white film and SLR cameras, learning to develop and print in the darkroom. As a class, we will cover the aesthetic, technical, and historic roles of the photographic medium.

# **Learning Outcomes:**

By the end of this course, students will be able to demonstrate the ability to:

- Interpret the fundamentals of the black-and-white photographic medium
- Formulate a vocabulary for evaluating photographs
- Demonstrate the role of exposure in making pictures
- Demonstrate the film development process
- Demonstrate the darkroom printing process
- Create photographs that demonstrate the role narrative plays in photography
- Create photographs that demonstrate the role abstraction plays in photography

The darkroom is a shared workspace with sensitive equipment and corrosive chemicals. How you conduct yourself directly affects both you and your fellow students. It is very important to take care of equipment, and safely handle chemicals for both your safety and the safety of others. Never place trays or chemicals on the enlarger stations or on dry areas. Dry areas include enlarger stations, finishing areas, light tables, and worktables. Always transport your prints in a small tray and watch for dripping water.
