Course Information:

Continuation of Photography I with emphasis on photographic aesthetics. Prerequisite: Art 209, 210, and 245 or consent of instructor. A \$40 lab fee is charged for this course. A special technology course fee of \$10 will also apply.

This is an intermediate-level photography course. It will review and build off the work you did in Photography 1. We will work exclusively with digital media, using Canon DSLRs, process images in Adobe Lightroom, and print archival inkjet printers in the lab. We will also cover the aesthetic, technical, and historic roles of photography.

Learning Outcomes:

By the end of this course, students will be able to demonstrate the ability to:

- Interpret the fundamentals of the digital photographic medium
- Formulate a vocabulary for evaluating photographs
- Demonstrate the role of exposure in making pictures
- Demonstrate the inkjet printing workflow
- Create photographs demonstrating your interpretation of the medium

Textbook:

Reference materials and links will be posted on Canvas. There is a required reference card available at the campus bookstore for a nominal price. *QUICKSTUDY* | *DIGITAL PHOTOGRAPHY BASICS LAMINATED REFERENCE GUIDE*.

Supplies:

A digital camera can be provided for you. If you have your own, check with Tom to make sure it is appropriate for the class. You will need an external hard drive for the files, SD cards for the camera, and a box of inkjet paper. Required supplies are fully explained on Canvas.

Outside of Class Work:

You will need to take pictures outside of class. There will also be times when the darkroom will be open, and you will be able to process film and make prints. We will work in class but

plan on spending time outside of class taking pictures and processing and printing. There will be a way for you to sign up for times to work.

Attendance:

Attendance is expected and required. Any absence could affect your final grade if it causes you to miss discussions or fall behind. More than two (2) absences may result in the lowering of your final grade. Attendance will be tracked on Canvas and factored into the weekly assignments.
