Course Description:

Understanding the Arts is a course providing students with an education that increases their understanding and appreciation of the visual arts. Students will explore concepts central to the University Studies Program Culture Category.

Humans have been engaged in Art making for thousands of years, making art to construct, cultivate, and investigate cultural practices spanning vast temporal and spatial distances. In Understanding the Arts, we will investigate the nuance, fluidity, and exchange of cultural practices through an exploration of Art. We will examine how artists, as individuals and members of cultural groups, utilize Art to develop a visual language that enables them to augment forms of communication, bridge cultural differences, and forge new cultural connections.
