Course Description

Investigation into the role of art in human development and learning. This course is focused on integrating visual art across the elementary and middle school curriculum as a tool for learning, assessment, and meeting the needs of diverse learners.

Learning Outcomes

Students in this course will

- Creatively explore multiple educational approaches to integrate visual arts in K-12 classrooms
- Critically analyze how visual arts enrich curriculum development and human life experiences
- Effectively develop interdisciplinary curricula and practice teaching performance for children to express themselves, discover the world, and interpret lived experiences
- Artistically reflect on your art-making experiences in this course and discover individualized teaching strategies for different disciplines
- Actively participate in individual and collective projects to foster collaboration, leadership, and creativity in the classroom
