Course Description:

Understanding the Arts is a University Studies Program Explore course providing students with an education that increases their understanding and appreciation of the visual arts. Students will explore concepts central to the **University Studies Program Culture Category**, such as human thought, its intellectual foundations, and/or creative expression in courses in the Humanities and the Fine and Performing Arts Divisions.

Humans have been engaged in Art making for thousands of years, making art to construct, cultivate, and investigate cultural practices spanning vast temporal and spatial distances. In *Understanding the Arts*, we will investigate the nuance, fluidity, and exchange of cultural practices through an exploration of Art. We will examine how artists, as individuals and members of cultural groups, utilize Art to develop a visual language that enables them to augment forms of communication, bridge cultural differences, and forge new cultural connections.

Quizzes will be weekly and multiple-choice format with questions covering content from the text, supplemental text materials, lectures, and additional content/materials presented in class. If you miss a quiz, you must provide proper documentation in order to be eligible for a makeup quiz. For example, if you are ill enough to miss a quiz, you will need documentation from a medical professional.

Activities will demonstrate how Learning Outcomes attained through exploration of course content are relevant to your personal lived experience in tangible ways. Most activities will be in the form of visiting museums. Visiting a work of art in person, within the gallery context, is an important part of understanding and appreciating art.

You will also have a few activities in-class done in groups. On those days I will provide you with a worksheet or what is necessary to complete the activity.

Discussion Posts are an efficient and effective means of concisely articulating your thoughts and ideas on the course content/materials. A substantive post will contain a thoughtful question or comment on the topic that may consist of a couple sentences. Contributions to discussion posts should demonstrate that you have explored the course content/material (text/readings, lectures, videos, in class discussions) and attempted to thoughtfully connect it to your lived experience. Although feedback ("I agree with so and so" or "I also thought that was cool") on discussion posts is encouraged, comments of that nature are not substantive enough to receive points for *Discussion Posts*.

For our purposes, class discussion should be about ideas, and these ideas may conflict with one another. Please be respectful of each other during online discussions. I suggest reading your comments out loud before posting and err on the side of caution when you feel strongly about (either in favor of or against) ideas presented in discussion posts. Remember, the purpose of *Discussion Posts* is not to "win" or "convince", but to demonstrate your exploration and understanding of ideas and concepts explored through course content.

At times, the content we explore (and possibly the feelings elicited by Art and Artists) in lecture and discussions may be emotionally or psychologically difficult to process. I will make every effort to prepare you in advance, but please feel free to remove yourself from the discussion if you feel overwhelmed.
