

NEWSPA offers more learning opportunities

Put together 350-plus high school students and nearly 50 media professionals presenting 40 sessions and what to you get?

Why, the 2015 NEWSPA conference, held April 22 at the University of Wisconsin Oshkosh, of course.

This year's conference included some firsts for NEWSPA:

- Every student and adviser who attended the keynote address presented by Frank LoMonte, executive director of the Student Press Law Association; Matt Smith, adviser to Fond du Lac High School's Cardinal Columns; and Rachel Schneider, former co-editor of the Cardinal Columns went home with a bag of goodies that included information on prior review and media law. The Gannett Foundation helped sponsor the event.
- Shortened campus tours gave prospective students a chance to see more of the UW Oshkosh campus and learn about other majors.
- NEWSPA played host to its first international speaker, Mirza Mehmedovic, a Fulbright Scholar at UW Oshkosh for 2014-15 and a former Bosnia and Herzegovina journalist.

But a big part of the day was spent celebrating student successes. More than 300 awards were presented to students for work on their newspapers, websites and yearbooks. Look inside to see some of the winning entries and what the judges wrote about those entries.

Outgoing President Sara Marquardt, adviser to Oshkosh North High School's Reflections year-book, was named the 2015 Skip Zacher Friend of Scholastic Journalism award recipient. Taking her place at the helm for the next three years will be Trent Scott, Oshkosh West High School newspaper adviser for The Index. While other board members agreed to stay on for another term, including Su-

san Carlson of Green Bay East, Lucas Cleary of Plymouth and Shannon Kuehmichel of Berlin, Jeff Carter of Hartford Union High School and Jason Cummings of Oshkosh North were also elected to the board for three-year terms.

Julia Lammers from Appleton North High School received the \$500 NEWSPA/Wisconsin Newspaper Association scholarship. She will be studying journalism at UW-Madison in the fall.

While NEWSPA is still going through surveys to find out which sessions you'd like to see back at the 2016 conference, we do know one thing: The NEWSPA conference will definitely have a new look in 2016. That's because Reeve Memorial Union is undergoing renovation. We're moving the conference to the UW Oshkosh Alumni Welcome and Conference Center, located on the banks of the Fox River, and Gruenhagen Conference Center, located just across the street from the AWCC. We know it will be more confusing to have two locations for speakers, but no one building on campus could accommodate our needs. The Board of Directors will be meeting in October 2015 and coming up with ways to make things run smoothly.

So for now, put April 20, 2016 on your calendar. We'd love to have you join us for the annual high school journalism conference. And if you have any ideas for speakers or how we could make the conference better, email me at benish@uwosh.edu or tell any of our Board members.

Enjoy your summer off, but if you'd like to get a head start planning for your publication, consider coming to our Summer 2015 Adviser Workshop. Oshkosh North High School English teacher and U.S. Army Reserve veteran Sara Marquardt received the Skip Zacher Friend of Scholastic Journalism Award at the Northeastern Wisconsin Scholastic Press Association spring conference on April 22.

Mike De Sisti, last year's Skip Zacher Award winner and the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel multimedia picture presented the award during the 2015 NEWSPA conference at UW Oshkosh.

Marquardt's dedication to journalism education and her work on the NEWSPA Board of Directors for 15 years, including

serving as the association's president for five years, is what made her an outstanding candidate for this year's award.

"For 15 years she has contributed fresh ideas for each conference and offered suggestions to improve the association," De Sisti said. "Furthermore, she has been a regular speaker for more than a decade and helped with the establishment of the online NEWSPA adviser resource center."

Marguardt has been a publications adviser since 2000. She is the current adviser to Oshkosh North's yearbook and former adviser to the school's newspaper,

as well as former adviser to the Berlin High School newspaper. Marquardt was also a drill sergeant, first sergeant, master sergeant and ROTC instructor in the U.S. Army Reserves and served overseas in Bosnia as a civil affairs specialist.

"Working with student journalists is one of the most rewarding aspects of my job as an educator,"

Marquardt said. "It's even work. The relationships Working with student journalists is one make with students advisers through NEWSPA has definitely enriched my life in so many ways. I am humbled and honored to receive such a prestigious award and will strive to work even harder to be deserving of it."

Substitute teacher shortage causes inconvenience

The school district has partnered with Parallel Services, a substitute teacher placement service that finds substitute teachers for the school district as needed.

"The teachers now call in to the service, or request a substitute online rather than having me find substitutes," Vice Principal Joe Brandl said.

This new service may sound much easier and faster, but an issue has risen. There have been numerous times where the school district has been short on substitute teach-


"Parallel Services based the hiring of subs on last year's numbers of subs needed, but this year we have more need than in prior years," Superintendent Dr. Robert Eidahl said. "This resulted in the service not having enough subs for

As of now, the new service has not saved nor lost the district any money compared to the previous

"It is supposed to save us money by the service paying the subs a different rate than the school district," Brandl said. "They handle things like workman's claims and insurance."

Not having enough subs available for the district greatly affects the staff. Many teachers will be asked to fill in for others during their prep periods and it creates an inconvenience.

"We are hoping that around this

time we receive more midterm said. graduates from colleges that will get their licenses for the first time and come into the sub pool for the rest of the year," Eidahl said,

Even if the lack of subs is resolved, having a multitude of substitute teachers will still affect the students.

"I feel that the substitute teachers we have had this year are not giving us the best ability to learn unless they are teachers we already know," junior Alicia Brownlow

The lack of substitutes may end up helping or hurting the students, depending on how they learn.

"I think the lack of subs has almost helped our students, because when a teacher they already know from the school subs for the class, they may learn better," Brandl said.

With fewer substitutes to choose from, the service ends up pulling the same subs repeatedly.

"I have been subbing way more this year than in previous years,"

Parallel Services is used to serving school districts from more urban areas, which usually have a wider variety of subs to choose

"I think it was a culture shock to them because we have such a small area to pull subs from," Eidahl said.

The district hopes that Parallel Services will adapt to the area, otherwise Eidahl said they will return to old ways.

However, I would have appreciated more information on the financial comparisons between the two systems as well as more quotes from the substitute and regular teachers. The survey information was nicely presented.

Writing/Style: The writer has a very concise, economical style. The lead was descriptive, grammar and punctuation consistently good, and the content was delivered in a logical manner.

School earns national Blue Ribbon Award

For the first time in school history, the U.S. Department of Education named Cedarburg High School a 2014 National Blue Ribbon School, recognizing the school for "Exemplary High Performance."

U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan will recognize CHS, along with other schools, at a ceremony in Washington D.C. Nov. 10-11. Principal Jeff Nelson and math department chairperson Mike Cullen will represent the school at the ceremony.

This award recognizes schools that have shown long-term success or have closed the achievement gap significantly. The two main factors considered are performance on state or national assessments and graduation rates over a long period of time. Over the past decade, CHS has excelled in these two categories.

"This award reflects the longterm success of CHS," Nelson said. "This award also puts us in an exclusive group of schools from across the country."

In 2014, only 48 high schools in the country were given the honor. CHS was the only high school recognized in the state.

"This award is even more special because instead of applying, we were nominated by the state," Nelson said.

In a news release from the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, state superintendent Tony Evers said the schools awarded "work together to put student learning at the center of daily activity."

Nelson credits the district's elementary and middle schools as well. "The other schools in the district prepare students for high school very well. This is really an award for the whole district, not just us here at the high school," Nelson said.

"This award is something that students and staff alike should be very proud of," he said.

In 2010, Westlawn Elementary School was also recognized as a National Blue Ribbon School.

The National Blue Ribbon School designation will also now be included in the school profile, according to director of counseling Greg Johnson. "Colleges will see that our students are well prepared for the demands of college," Johnson said.

The department chairs voted Cullen to serve as the teacher

The Nigeria Kidnappings

178 Reasons Why You Should Care

n the evening of April 14, the Islamic-Jihadist terrorist orga-nization Boko Haram raided the Governmental Secondary School in Chibok, Nigeria, kidnapping more than 250 girls aged 16-18 years old. Boko Haram immediately took responsibility, claiming the reasons for this action was the strong beliefs Boko Haram holds against the western-based education the girls were receiving. Unsatisfied with the lack of effort on behalf of the Nigerian government, locals took to social media and made a plea to the world using the hashtag #BringBackOurGirls. The campaign garnered the attention of influential figures such as Michelle Obama and Malala Yousafzai. Shortly after, numerous countries began to get involved, sending assistance to work with the Nigerian government. On May 27, the Nigerian government confirmed that they had located the kidnapped girls and were working on negotiating to get the girls back. In developed nations, it's common for people

to assume that events like this are merely a part of the "primitive culture" in third world countries. It's easy to detach ourselves from a situation in another country that we can't control, but here's why you should care.

- 1. Girls in sub-Saharan Africa often aren't viewed as worthy of or needing to receive an education. The girls who were kidnapped were coura-geous enough to fight cultural stigmas. When they were kidnapped, the girls, who were in their last years of secondary education, were preparing to take their last finals.
- More than 9,000 kidnappings take place annually in sub-Saharan Africa, with more than two-thirds taking place in Nigeria. This is not an uncommon or isoated incident.
- Educating girls has been proven to lower rates of HIV/AIDS, reduce teen pregnancy, improve maternal health, reduce infant mortality, and even improve the local/national economy. 50% of girls in Africa who are enrolled in school drop out by 4th grade for various reasons such as inabil-

ity to pay school fees, no way to get to school, illness, responsibility to take care of family, because they're married off, etc. Only 30% of girls who finish primary school have the opportunity to go to secondary school, and only 1/3 actually finish secondary school. It's important to remember that even though they may finish primary school, the resources they're granted are very limited, resulting in a much slower learning process. What does that mean? 64% drop out before they're fully literate.

- The girls are being sold into marriage and used as sex slaves. For the low price of \$12, extremists are purchasing the girls for the purpose of marriage. This is really just another way to say that they're being sold into sexual slavery.
- Boko Haram is gaining momentum. US security expert Daniel Benjamins has gone as far as to say Boko Haram is the world's deadliest group. Since the Abuja kidnappings, Boko Haram has not ceased to kidnap more girls. On May 7 the group open fired in a market, with an estimated 310 people killed. In fact, more than 2,000 have been killed by the group in the year 2014 alone.
