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

What is the McNair Program?

The Ronald E. McNair Scholars Program, a federally funded TRIO Program, assists bright, highly motivated undergraduates from underrepresented backgrounds acquire the skills they need to get into and succeed in graduate school. The University of Wisconsin Oshkosh is privileged to be one of only 187 institutions nation-wide afforded the opportunity to offer our students the benefits of this prestigious program.



Malykee Hall (Oshkosh, WI), a biology major, will be working with Dr. Sabrina Mueller-Spitz researching the biodiversity and physiology of the aquatic *Deinococcus* bacteria in Lake Winnebago.

Brenna Prieto (Sheboygan, WI), a psychology major with a Spanish minor, will conduct research with Dr. Justyna Olszewska. The focus of their project will be on memory distortions for familiar and unfamiliar company logos.



Rachel McKay (Jackson, WI), a biology major with a chemistry minor, will be researching chemoreception in insects with Dr. Robert Mitchell. A better understanding of how insects smell could contribute to finding more effective and less toxic methods of pest control.

Braini McKenzie (Oshkosh, WI), an education major with a minor in psychology, will work with Dr. Alicia Johnson to examine leadership development experiences of students of color at predominantly white institutions of higher education.

Riley Drechsler (Wisconsin Rapids, WI), an anthropology major with a Spanish minor, will, with the help of her mentor Dr. Adrienne Frie, focus on the mortuary practices at Magdalenska Gora Iron Age settlement (located in Slovenia today). Their research will take them to the Peabody Institute at Harvard, where the majority of archaeological artifacts from this site are found. Together they hope to gain insight into social stratification and gender roles.

Alicia Obermeier (Appleton, WI), human services leadership major with a minor in women's and gender studies, is interested in how the LBGTQ+ community has taken ownership of the formerly derogatory word "queer" while continuing to denounce "faggot." She will take a socio-linguistic approach to "queer" identities. In doing so, she hopes to shed light on the ways in which non-heteronormative individuals defined themselves before taking ownership of "queer" as an inclusive, umbrella term for all sexual and gender minorities. Alicia's mentor is Dr. Jerry Thomas.

Aubrey Wzientek (Marengo, IL), a kinesiology major, is particularly interested in performance and rehabilitation. With her mentor Dr. Brian Wallace, she will compare the differing body mechanics, which result when collegiate softball players bat off of a tee versus strike at a front toss. The UW Oshkosh women's softball team has agreed to participate in this study.

Angel Camacho (Kenosha, WI), a dual-degree seeking student majoring in both education and business, is interested in finding ways to improve student learning outcomes. For the purpose of his study, he and his mentor Dr. Benjamin Artz are testing the effectiveness of using the Cornell notetaking method in microecon classes.

Elias Flor Martinez (Menasha, WI), a biology major, will be working with Dr. Jessica Lucas in the field of plant cell biology. They will research microtubule organization and the molecular mechanism of guard cells, essential in the regulatory function of stomata. This functionality will help scientists find ways to produce plants that can tolerate hostile climates with the goal of preventing a food shortage.

Doua Xiong (Wausau, WI), a biology major, will be working with Dr. Morgan Churchill in the field of evolutionary biology with a focus on marine mammals and cranial anatomy. They will research differences in the cranial anatomy affecting the temporalis muscle size to better understand evolution.

Joy Evans (Milwaukee, WI), an environmental health major, will be analyzing student health data with her mentor Juliana Kahrs, MPH. The two will examine UW Oshkosh student health surveys to better understand potential chronic health issues associated with food insecurity among students of color.

Stacey Sparks (Neenah, WI), an English education major, will work with Dr. Yoko Mogi-Hein on a project which examines the impact of programs designed to address the challenges of children faced with poverty, trauma, and neglect. As part of this project, she hopes to work with UW Oshkosh Head Start Program to assess non-identifiable data collected over the last 10 years.

Megan Elger (Hartford, WI), a communications major, will research family estrangement, focusing on how estranged adult children are impacted by the messages they receive from society. Megan, who just completed her Associate's at UW Fond du Lac, and her mentor Dr. Kristi Wilkum, are the first to be recruited into McNair from a UW Oshkosh Access Campus.



Daniel Obi (Madison, WI), a biology major, will be working with Dr. Paulson on apoptosis, also known as cell death. Their research question is "What key mechanism/s in mitotic arrested cells is/are responsible for apoptosis?" Their findings could provide a valuable contribution in the field of cancer research.

Mia Wilson (Milwaukee, WI) is a double major in political science and women's and gender studies with a minor in social justice. She is interested in identifying key factors that contribute to building an environment of inclusivity for students of color at predominantly white institutions (PWI) such as UW Oshkosh. She will be conducting her research with Dr. Heidi Nicholls.

In addition, Sarah won the Dr. Tomás Garrett-Rosas Research Award, created to recognize a graduate student whose research interests demonstrate a focus on social justice and potential for community outreach. Dr. Garrett-Rosas was himself a McNair Scholar and inspiring role model. The award amounts to \$3,000 over two years. All McNair scholars accepted into UWM graduate programs are automatically awarded a \$6,000 scholarship.


